Dear Families,

Last Friday, **Deborah**, **Hannah** and myself had the privilege of presenting at a **MACS Staff Seminar Day at the Catholic Leadership Centre in Melbourne.** We were invited to share one aspect of our school improvement journey. While we could have chosen to present one of many aspects of our school improvement journey, we chose to present the journey to improved Spelling results; the significant spelling improvement we have strategically planned for during the past few years. We repeated the same presentation four times to different MACS staff. The feedback was overwhelmingly positive and affirming that the evidence informed education we provide for our students is making a real and positive difference. In preparing for this MACS presentation, it was both heart warming and rewarding to see how our school improvement journey has evolved, particularly over the past five years. As we have now entered the next cycle of improvement after our 2024 School Review, I am excited about what this year and the next three years will bring. We have given ourselves some ambitious goals and targets and we are all working together to see them achieved.

Our school enrolment process for 2026 is now complete. Throughout the first semester, I have enjoyed the opportunity to showcase all that is happening at St Mary's School through tours and interviews. While many have commented on our school's highly regarded, popular and positive reputation in the Geelong community, after touring the school as students have been learning, many have commented about our students' overall learning engagement and behaviour. This is in contrast to the increasing number of articles about the decline in student and family behaviour in schools, recently highlighted in the media.

I am proud to share that overall, positive and respectful conduct is consistently demonstrated by our students and their families. While national discussions focus on challenges such as classroom disruptions and the need for improved discipline, our school community exemplifies the benefits of proactive and inclusive approaches to student behaviour. We believe that setting high behavioural expectations and providing consistent support empowers our students to take responsibility for their actions and contributes to a positive school climate. When behaviour expectations are not met, we use them as teachable moments. Our commitment to school-wide high expectations for all has been instrumental in fostering a culture of safety, respect and responsibility among our students and wider school community. By clearly defining behavioural expectations and providing regular opportunities for students to practice these behaviours, we have created a supportive learning environment where positive behaviour and conduct is the norm. This approach is evident in our students' enthusiastic participation in school events,





their respectful interactions with peers and staff and their dedication to creating an inclusive school community.

No-one is perfect, or expected to be perfect, child or adult. Therefore, when we do not behave at our best, support is provided, expectations reiterated, forgiveness granted and another opportunity to be better, given. As we continue to navigate the complexities of education, we remain committed to nurturing an school environment where positive behaviour is recognised, celebrated and integral to our students' success.

Thank you to our Parents and Friends' Association who work behind the scenes to 'friendraise' and 'fundraise'. If you're in a position to do so, please support them and the events and activities they have planned for our school over the coming weeks.

This dedicated time allows teachers to closely examine student work samples and data, identify future goals, and discuss strategies that are having a positive impact on learning. By sharing these achievements, insights and best practices, our teachers then make informed decisions about how to support students more effectively and tailor instruction to meet their needs. This collaborative approach ensures that all students benefit from a consistent and evidencebased approach to teaching across the school.

The insights gained from this collaborative day will also directly inform our upcoming school reports. **Student Progress Reports will be distributed to families, via email, on Tuesday 1 July**. Please check that your Operoo primary and secondary email addresses are up to date on your child/ren's profiles.

Parent-teacher Conversations are another opportunity to share your child's achievements this semester. These meetings will take place on Tuesday 24 June and Wednesday 25 June (3:30-6:00pm) and play a vital role in supporting student success by fostering a strong partnership between home and school. They provide an opportunity for teachers to share your child's academic progress, strengths, and areas for growth, while also giving you a chance to ask questions or share any important information with us. Open and honest communication helps ensure that everyone is working together toward the same goals, creating a consistent and supportive environment for your child. Students do not attend these scheduled meetings with you. Booking information has been sent to all families via Operoo and details can also be found on page 3 of the newsletter.

Other opportunities, such as sharing current learning on **SeeSaw** and **Open Classrooms**, are provided to complement written progress reports and Parent Teacher Conversations. Sharing Great Practice & Results in Spelling!


We are proud to share that on Friday 30 May, members of our school's leadership team; Annice Lappin, Deborah Boland and Hannah Jackson, were invited to present at the Melbourne Archdiocese of Catholic Schools (MACS), Staff Seminar Day, highlighting our journey in using evidence-based research to enhance the teaching and learning of spelling.


Since 2018, our leadership team, classroom teachers and learning support officers have gradually implemented

structured, research-informed approaches to spelling instruction, focusing on explicit teaching and Direct Instruction of phonemic awareness, phoneme and grapheme correspondences, etymology and morphology. This work has not only transformed classroom practice but has also led to measurable improvements in student outcomes. Our 2024 NAPLAN results reflect this success, with outstanding achievements evident in spelling across all year levels, demonstrating St Mary's School's commitment to academic excellence and continual improvement through research informed practice and data-driven strategies.

We are yet to receive the data from NAPLAN assessment for 2025, but adjacent are our 2024 results for spelling in Year 3 and Year 5. St Mary's School is represented by the blue line and all Australian school results are represented by the grey line.

We are immensely proud of the work everyone has contributed to this success!
